CSA Information

Community Supported Agriculture,

or CSA, is a system in which you and your family become "shareholders" of the farm, and receive a share of each week's harvest. The benefit to you: freshly picked produce throughout the growing season, from a farmer and garden you trust. The benefit for us: better and more efficient retail planning without the uncertainty of sales.

All-veggie (full):

Five full shares will be offered this season at a \$400 value. I want to start small to ensure excellent quality, and to distribute **at least** the value of the share price in veggies. Pick-up days will be Wednesdays from June-October.

All veggies (weekender):

Ten weekender shares, valued at \$150, will be offered for those of you who only visit the HRV on weekends and don't need to pack to fridge. You can choose to have a smaller share every week, or larger shares every other week from June-October. Pick-up on Fridays.

Strictly floral

Fifteen floral shares, valued at \$125, will be offered as well for a 12-week pick-your-own bouquets in the labyrinth.

BONUSES:

As a CSA member, you get first dibs on eggs when they come into production. You will also be offered "winter storage" discounts on bumper crops that need processing and storing for winter months!

Sample Spring Share:

¹⁄₄ lb baby spinach 1 head lettuce 1 lb sugar snaps 1 bu radish 1 bu scallions flowers herbs

Sample Summer Share:

1bu beets 2 heads garlic 3 lbs tomatoes 1 lb green beans 2 lbs summer squash 2 lbs cucumbers 6 ears sweet corn 1 head lettuce 1 bunch carrots 1 lb totatoes flowers herbs

Sample Fall Share:

2 lbs onions 1 lb broccoli/cauliflower 2 winter squash 2 peppers 1 bu turnips 2 lbs potatoes 1 basket cherry tomatoes 1 eggplant ¼ lb spinach 1 bu kale/chard/collards hot peppers flowers herbs

** All these will be available at the farm stand on weekends as well! **
